


Value-based healthcare (VBHC) can help improve treatment for breast cancer

WHO's Global Breast Cancer Initiative aims to reduce breast cancer mortality by 2.5% per year.

Over 20 years, this could save **2.5 million lives.**

Here are three ways VBHC can make a difference.



Using available resources to achieve better patient outcomes and experiences.

The 'value' in VBHC is derived from ensuring that patients receive the **best outcome** from the care they receive, while doing so at the most **reasonable cost**.



2 Patient-reported Outcome 2 Measures (PROMs) help do more with less.

Shared decision-making, involving both patients and clinicians, can help in **doing less of the things that don't help patients** and reinvesting that money into more things that do.

B Putting quality above quantity.

VBHC aims to link healthcare payments to quality of outcomes.

This shifts incentives for providers from performing more treatments to **better treatments**, resulting in cost reduction.
